CAR SHOW 82

The 1982 Old Car Show & Swap Meet is scheduled for August 21& 22. Again, our goal is geared for an extremely large turnout. Those of you that attended last year, we certainly encourage you to return, and those of you that were unable to attend last year, we hope you will be able to bring your vehicles. We also anticipate that we will be using the same facilities at the airport for the special Kissel Kar display. Last year we had 10,000 people in attendance from 22 states and hopefully this year we will achieve an attendance of 15-20,000. There has been one important change, in that there will not be a Kissel Kar parade this year. It seems that some of the general public that came to the show didn't arrive until about 5:00 p.m. and of course, most of the Kissels'were gone as they were in the parade. Also the difficulties that we had in unguarded intersections made me and some of the drivers extremely nervous. Last but not least, local residents felt that the parade was going to consist of every car at the show! It is the general consensus that maybe a parade can be scheduled every second or third year when we can obtain more manpower to handle the intersections. Saturday night after the show there will be another banquet meeting for the Kissel Kar owners and enthusiasts, similar to the banquet/meeting last year but at a different location to be announced. For those of you that were unable to attend last year, the Milwaukee area is approximately 35 miles South East of Hartford, with a considerable number of establishments for housing. HARTFORD TIMES PRESS - 1923

With the elements greatly in their favor, associated with the prompt and efficient work of the Hartford Fire Department, are the outstanding circumstances that nipped in the bud what might have taken on proportions of a serious conflagration at the Kissel Motor Co. last Friday evening. As it was, damage estimated by officials of the company as running at figures between \$ 75,000 and \$ 100,000 was done to the building and contents in a short but spectacular blaze. The greatest loss is on cars and equipment,17 machines being reduced to a mass of charred bodies and twisted iron, while some 43 additional cars, a large number of them beautiful new machines were damaged more or less by contact with the fumes and smoke and water. The fire occurred shortly after 7:00 p.m. in the building known as the repair department, a brick structure 40x350 feet in size.

KISSEL USED DAILY

Jackson Barnhart, a real Kissel fan, has owned his 1922 Kissel 6-45 Speedster for 45 years, operating it and an Auburn Speedster as his only cars. Being an entertainer with a small band, the cars have been useful to him in advertising his services, especially the Kissel "Gold Bug" in its flashy chrome yellow color.

For the past few years the Kissel engine has given him alot of trouble. Considerable money Jackson has invested in re-working the engine has been to no avail. He has therefore concluded that it would be better for him to turn the car over to someone who could rebuild the the engine or could install another Kissel 6-45 or even a 6-55 engine and trade an enclosed Kissel to him that is in excellent condition for daily use. Since his Speedster is valuable, even with a crippled engine, he would be entitled to some cash difference.

The '22 "Gold Bug" has had practical restorations such as top covering and re-painting over the years. Its original wheels which took $32x4\frac{1}{2}$ tires were either cut down or were replaced to take balloon tires, and all six do not match, one or more being from a Marmon. The original nickel plated diamond-shaped bumpers have been replaced with plain ones from the 1930s. Headlamps are the Edmunds & Jones " football-shaped" lights with small 3-inch lenses such as were mounted on a number of Kissels and other cars in the 1920s, doubtless as aftermarket items purchased outside.

WISCONSIN HIGHWAYS

Today most of us take good roads for granted, and we all expect to find every route well-marked and easy to follow with an up-to-date road map, free at any filling station. It was not always like this, however, as some of us will remember. Once there were no markers and the choice was not of a paved road--just one that had been graveled.

As nearly as we can tell the first push for good, well-marked roads came in Wisconsin through the efforts of the Milwaukee Journal, leading daily in the state, and in particular its Automobile Editor, W.W."Brownie" Rowland. His elfin countenance surmounted by cap and goggles was his trade-mark on his articles which first appeared on the sports pages. Gradually a complete automobile page evolved.

Brownie constantly changed cars, furnished by the factory or a dealer. 1920 copy from the Kisselgraph, house organ of the Kissel Motor Car Company, concerning Brownie's 1919 trek which, incidentally, produced the nickname "Gold Bug" for the yellow Kissel Speedster model. The Poor Cus, who is mentioned, was Brownie's assistant who reported his own amusing versions of the trips. Certainly the whole program of paving and marking highways was much advanced through Brownie's travels which added up to 50,000 miles a year or more and resulted in Wisconsin highway travel being the country's best until well into the twenties when others caught up.




