A Rendezvous with Annie in Hartford! Guest Article

By Lynn Kissel, Livermore, California All the vehicles owned by Jeanne and me have names. Why, doesn't everyone anthropomorphize* their vehicles by giving them names? Some Kisselkar klub members have already met (at least parts) of Bugsby, our 1924 Kissel 6-55 Speedster. Jeanne and I brought the running chassis of the oldest of twelve Australian Kissels to the 100-year anniversary celebration of the Kissel Motor Car Company in Hartford in 2006. Since then the car has been successfully reassembled and is back on the road. He runs beautifully.

(Bugsby's name is intended to conjure images of the "Jazz Age" as described in F. Scott Fitzgerald's novel The Great **Gatsby**. On one hand I fantasize about opulence and glamour of the "roaring" 1920s, yet am simultaneously bothered by the lack of morality and unrestrained materialism that this era of unprecedented prosperity represents. Maybe this story has some lessons for us in our own times?)

Given this predilection for naming our cars, you might not be surprised that we've selected Annie as the name for our new (old) 1914 KisselKar 4-40 Touring. Annie was formerly owned by E. Ann (Fisher) Klein (d. March 31, 2007, in Elizabethtown, PA). Ann's grandfather acquired the car in the fall of 1949 from John Edward Julian (b. June 8, 1928; d. July 2, 1999, in Milwaukee, WI). The car was painted in the fall of 1949 and an initial "F" matching the pin striping is applied to each side of the car body between the doors. Ann Klein wrote that when John Julien purchased the car, Annie was being used to power a farm saw and that John "brought her back to life."

Some of you may know that Ann Klein founded Universal Vintage Tire in 1968, to satisfy the demands of avid collectors (in particular her husband) to drive on vintage tires. Part of her car collection including Annie and a rare 1931 "blower" boat tail Bentley were sold by Gooding & Company at auction at Pebble Beach in 2007. (The Bentley went for no less than \$4.51M – that's mil lions of dollars!)

Jeanne and I acquired Annie (sight unseen) in October 2008, from Hyman Ltd Classic Cars in St. Louis, Missouri.

With the permission of Dale Anderson, we had the car shipped directly in the Wisconsin Automotive Museum in Hartford for display. I'm in Hartford, now (December 10-13, 2008), to get my first real look at our pretty girl. My timing is impeccable as I arrive in the middle of the biggest storm of the winter season, to date. While it isn't something I would have wished for, as I crawl at times at 10 mph on the drive from Chicago, the resulting fresh snow makes everything in Hartford especially beautiful.

Dale has graciously helped me make connections with a local mechanic and upholsterer to begin some needed repairs on the car. With luck, Annie will be in a more presentable state befitting a lady of her age for the next meeting of the KisselKar Klub on Father's Day weekend, June 20th, 2009. I expect that Jeanne and I will be there with Annie.

Will we see you there, too?

Annie's car number is 15471 (engine #15457). Currently only two other 1914 Kissel 4-40s are listed in the KisselKar Klub roster. One car is a 5-passenger Touring owned by Andrew Wilson (Brunswick ME), car number 15068 (engine #15118). The other car is a rebodied Semi-Racer (formerly also a 5-

passenger Touring owned by John Quam (Montara, CA), car number 15314 (engine #15240). Note that the engine numbers are in the same 15xxx sequence as the body numbers. I don't know for sure, but it would seem reasonable to me that Kissel wouldn't assign the same serial number to both a body and an engine.

It is reported that 1914 Kissel 4-40 cars were assigned numbers 15001-15601; numbers15602-16000 are not listed as being assigned to any other vehicles of any year (Grace Brigham, The Serial Number Book for U.S. Cars 1900-1975). Kissel was known to pre-assign vehicle numbers, so not all numbers necessarily resulted in a manufactured vehicle. This would imply that no more than 600 1914 Model 40 vehicles were produced. If the speculation that 15xxx serial numbers were individually used for either a body or an engine but never for both, than fewer than 300 1914 Model 40 vehicles were produced.

Kissel total production for 1914is quoted as being 896 (TROMBINOSCAR.) In 1914, Kissel produced model 40, 48 and 60 cars, and a line of trucks of 1500 pound, 1-1/2 ton and 5 ton sizes. It

seems reasonable to me that 300 1914 Model 40 cars may have produced (about 1/3 of the total production). It seems less likely to me that Model 40 cars represented 2/3 of the total 1914 production by Kissel.

The list price for a 1914 Kissel 4-40 5-passenger Touring was \$1,850 f.o.b. ("freight on board" Hartford, WI). If you use the CPI (Consumer Price Index) to adjust this price, Annie would cost about \$40,500 in 2008 dollars.
