Doug Kissel tells us of successfully using a modern serpentine drive belt as a fan belt on his 1925 Kissel 6-55 Enclosed Speedster (car# 55-5503). Although others on the AACA Forums had success running a serpentine belt "ribs up" or "ribs down", the belt would only stay on the pulleys with "ribs up" for Doug. The forum conversation identified multiple sources for flat leather belts.

Doug Kissel has been making progress on the brakes of his 1925 Kissel 6-55 Enclosed Speedster (car# 55-5503). Replacing the return springs considerably helped with his efforts to adjust the clearance between the drums and the bands.

Joe Leaf has published a YouTube video with the first engine start of the restoration-in-progress of his 1922 Kissel 6-45 Speedster (car# 45-6026). This was the first engine start since 1992. Experience some of the excitement, as friends and family take turns running up and down the driveway. Joe makes a speed run at timestamp 8:10.

Restoration Completed

Doug Bess, Fire Chief of the Salida/ South Arkansas Fire Department, sends this update on the restoration of their 1911 KisselKar Fire Engine (car# 2T-5624). Detailed restoration plans were noted in *Kisselgraph* 2015, Vol. 41, No. 1 (June). That article displayed some remarkable historical images of the truck in service to the city.

Chief Bess tells us...

"After being awarded the state historical grant in 2015, and after raising over \$20K in matching funds, it was time to find a restoration expert. We chose Doug Klink with Reliance Fire Museum in Estes Park, Colorado. The truck was delivered to Reliance Fire Museum on June 11, 2015.

The first year was spent locating missing crucial parts such as headlights, coach lights, rear torches, carburetor, etc. Beginning in 2016, the truck was disassembled and the parts were categorized.

At this point, we discovered that the frame was bent from an accident in the past. The frame was shipped to Boulder, Colorado

and straightened.

Throughout 2017, every part on the truck was media blasted and painted. Parts were shipped off to platers around the country. The aluminum drive plate on the clutch had to be rebuilt from scratch. The leather on the leather cone clutch was replaced and the water pump had to be rebuilt by a fabricator in Arizona.

In 2018, the project really started coming together. The painting and plating was all done and re-assembly of the truck had begun.

I asked the restorer if he could have the truck back to Salida for our annual FibArk Parade on **June 15**, 2018. With a lot of long days, the truck arrived on **June 14t**h and was unveiled in the parade.

Since having the truck back, it has been in multiple local parades, a local car show, a chamber of commerce event, and was on display for an open house at the local museum.

A couple of historical notes; when sand blasting the frame, the original gold leaf was discovered. The original black leather



and horse hair were found under the reupholstered seat."

The nearby images show the exquisite detail and high quality of restoration effort. The excellent results must surely contribute to a justified community pride in the citizens of Salida.
